14.25	From ambition to adoption: delivering simulation at scale <i>Simulation is widely recognised as a powerful approach to education for improving clinical competence, decision-making, and patient safety. Yet despite strong ambition across institutions, scaling simulation remains difficult. Rather than asking “What more simulation could we deliver?”, this panel will explore whether staff are ready to deliver simulation confidently and whether are our institutions structured to support and sustain it.
